## INTRODUCTION TO TRINITY COLLEGE DUBLIN

Trinity College Dublin, founded in 1592, is Ireland's oldest and most internationally renowned university and one of the oldest universities in Europe. The School of Law, established in 1740, is ideally located in the College's historic campus in the city centre, close to the courts, Oireachtas (parliament), museums and galleries.

Trinity College is an intimate part of the city at whose heart it stands, crossed by hundreds of Dubliners who use it as a daily thoroughfare. Trinity is central to Irish life. Many of the famous people of Irish letters and history were educated at Trinity – writers such as Swift, Goldsmith, Wilde and Beckett, and Ireland's first President, Douglas Hyde, as well as the former President of Ireland, Mary Robinson. No stranger to controversy, Trinity has often provided an independent and liberal voice in the affairs of the state.

The College, founded by Queen Elizabeth I, is based on the general pattern of the ancient colleges at Oxford and Cambridge. Trinity College is larger, with a campus extending over fifty-one acres in a unique site in the centre of the city.

The campus comprises five quadrangles or squares, many with buildings constructed in the eighteenth century. The Old Library, located in the heart of the campus, is home to the priceless 8th Century manuscript, the Book of Kells, which, like the university in general, is one of Ireland's leading tourist attractions. Today's campus sees many state-of-the-art libraries, lecture theatres, laboratories, IT facilities and recreational facilities standing alongside these historic buildings.



The University Library is one of the largest in Europe, with over 4.25 millions volumes and extensive collections built up since the 16th Century and over 200,000 electronic books and 25,000 core academic journals available online. The Berkeley, Lecky and Ussher Library complex houses all law publications and resources and is equipped with numerous electronic data connections and study carrels for postgraduate students. Postgraduate students can also enjoy exclusive 24 hour access to the 1937 Postgraduate Reading Room.

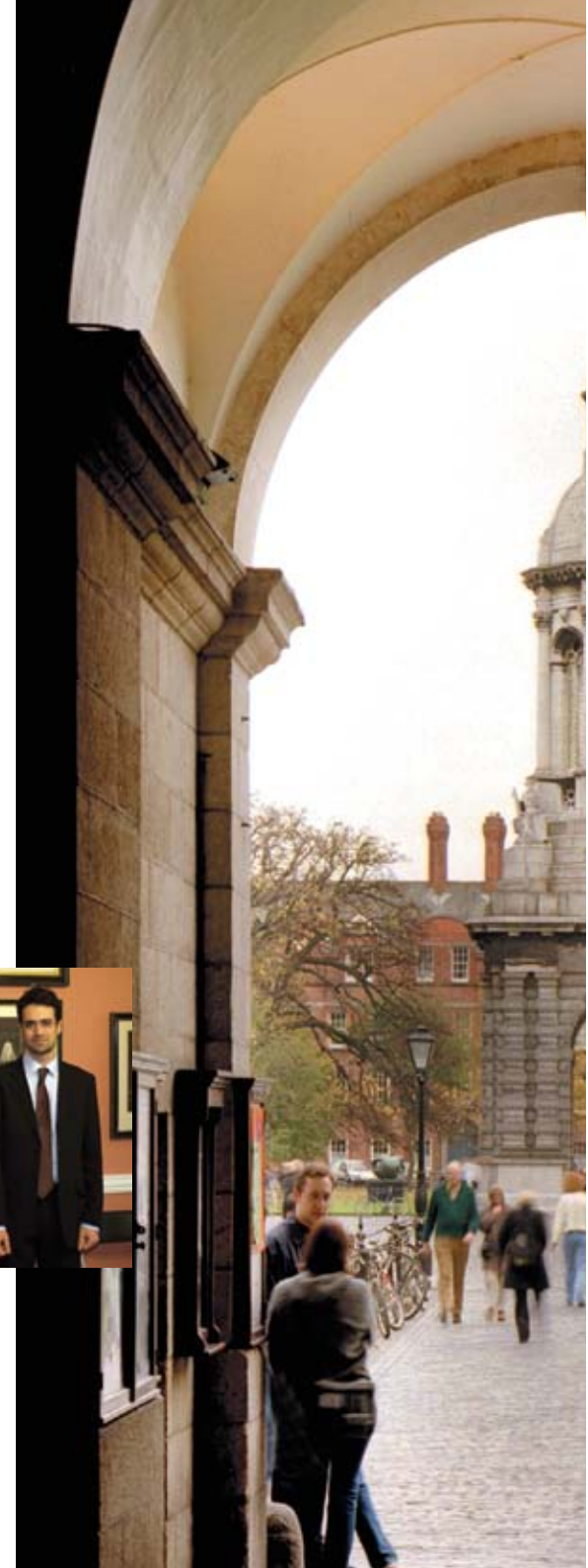

## GENERAL INFORMATION

### *Academic Year Structure*

The academic year in Trinity College Dublin is divided into two teaching **semesters** (Michaelmas and Hilary Term) and a third term for revision and final examinations (Trinity Term).

Each teaching semester is of 12 weeks duration, with a reading/study week taking place in the 7th week of both semesters.

The academic year commences in September. Lectures finish in April and the compulsory research dissertation must be submitted by the end of June.

### *Examinations*

There are two examination periods: January for examination of first semester modules and April/May for second semester modules.

### *European Credit Transfers (ECTS)*

Students reading for a postgraduate taught degree in Law at Trinity College Dublin must study 90 European Credit Transfers (ECTS) over the duration of the academic year. This entails 30 ECTS worth of taught modules per semester and 30 ECTS for a Research Dissertation.

The ECTS weighting for a module is a measure of the student input or workload required for that module, based on factors such as the number of contact hours, the number and length of written or verbally presented assessment exercises, class preparation and private study time, classes, and examinations. There is no intrinsic relationship between the credit volume of a module and its level of difficulty.

In Trinity College Dublin, 1 ECTS unit is defined as 20-25 hours of student input so a 10-credit module will be designed to require 200-250 hours of student input including class contact time, private study and assessments.

### *Course Structures*

Each taught postgraduate programme in Law is a full-time programme.

In order to be eligible for the award of one of our LL.M. degrees, students must successfully complete 90 ECTS. The breakdown of credits are allocated as follows:

30 ECTS of optional modules in Michaelmas Term;  
30 ECTS of optional modules in Hilary Term; and  
30 ECTS awarded for a Research Dissertation (see below).

### *Optional Modules*

Each of our four LL.M. degree programmes offer a diverse range of intellectually challenging and relevant modules. Each module is offered in one semester only. 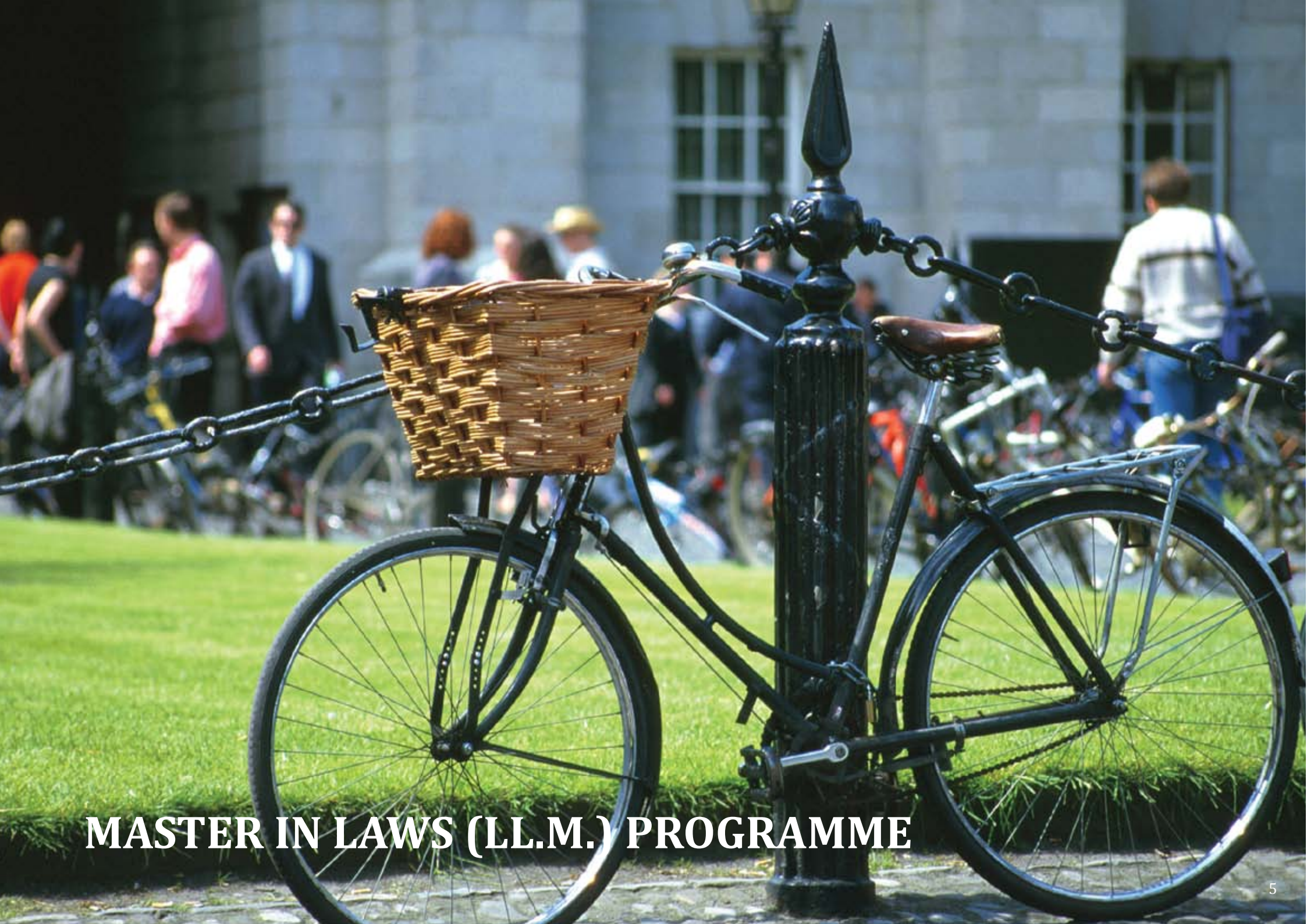
Modules are generally taught in 2-hour blocks.

### *Research Dissertation*

The research dissertation, of up to a maximum of 25,000 words, and not more than 75 pages, may be on any theme, subject to the approval of the Director of the LL.M. degree programme and the availability of a supervisor. The dissertation must be submitted by the end of June.

\* The Law School Committee reserves the right to fix a quota for any particular module or to withdraw a module or, in a particular academic year, to introduce an additional module or to decline to offer a module.

The Master in Laws (LL.M.) degree is directed at well-qualified graduates in law and related disciplines. It seeks to promote critical analysis of, and reflection on, different aspects of national, European and international law.

It is the perfect programme for students who do not wish to be overly specialised in their postgraduate studies and who wish to broaden their knowledge base and to enhance their legal qualifications.

With the increased globalisation of the last twenty years and, even earlier, with the rise to prominence of the international human rights movement, there has been a huge impetus for students of all nationalities towards studying areas of law with a broad international and comparative law focus. In the LLM (International and Comparative Law) we offer students the chance to study from a large list of modules with a broad international and comparative law feel - many of which relate, unsurprisingly to international and regional human rights law. Students are also required to complete a 25,000 word dissertation on a topic covered by the broad heading of international and comparative law, and approved by the course director.

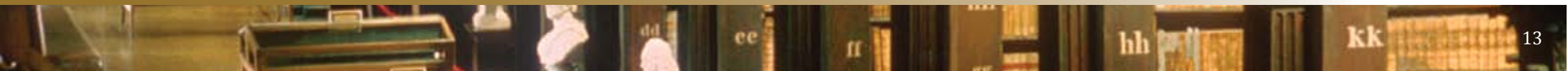

## POSTGRADUATE RESEARCH DEGREES IN LAW

The School of Law offers two postgraduate research degrees. The Master in Letters (M.Litt ) and the Doctorate in Philosophy (Ph.D.).

Degree	Duration
M.Litt (Master in Letters)	1-2 years full-time or 2-3 years part-time
Ph.D. (Doctor in Philosophy)	2-4 years full-time or 3-6 years part-time (which period will include any time spent on the M.Litt register).

A student registered for the M.Litt degree is required to carry out research under the supervision of a full time member of the academic staff in a legal topic. The minimum qualifications for admission as a Ph.D. student are higher than those for admission as a M.Litt. student. In particular, applicants must show evidence of **marked aptitude for research**.

### *Current Postgraduate Students*

The Law School currently has 95 Postgraduate Research Students (PGR) on its Ph.D. and M.Litt programmes. A list of selected current PGR students and their theses titles are available on the Law School website:

### *Postgraduate Seminars*

All Postgraduate students are invited to attend weekly lunch-time seminars. These involve dealing with aspects of the business of being a legal research student and they involve student presentations on matters connected with their theses and discussion in respect of such presentations. This workshop provides a forum for the presentation and discussion of work in progress from different areas of law. The hope is that it will encourage the testing of ideas at an early stage and generate a culture of lively discussion.

# ADMISSIONS

## POSTGRADUATE ADMISSIONS AND APPLICATIONS

### *Entry Requirements for Postgraduate Study at Trinity College Dublin*

**Postgraduate work in Trinity College Dublin is very academically challenging and as a result the University has high academic entry requirements.**

Applicants will need to hold:

- at least a 2.1 honors degree from an Irish university or equivalent result from a university in another country. In the case of entry requirements for postgraduate degrees in Law, generally a good honors degree in law or law-based interdisciplinary degree;
- a fluent command of the English language;
- Admission to each taught programme is at the exclusive discretion of the LL.M. sub-committee, who will decide on questions of admission having regard to the totality of the application files and the objectives of ensuring a diverse LL.M. class of the highest possible academic calibre;
- Admission requirements may vary from year to year.

Whether you are applying for a taught or research course you must apply for your postgraduate course using the **Trinity College Postgraduate Course Finder**

All prospective students must submit their applications through this online application portal. Applications are not sent directly to the School.

In addition to the online application form, the following supporting documentation must be uploaded in order for your application to be deemed complete and processed:

- Two academic references;
- Academic transcript(s) which must be certified by the issuing body, final year students should submit academic transcripts containing all results available to date;
- Research proposal (if applying for an M.Litt or Ph.D.);
- Certified copy of degree certificate(s) for all completed academic and professional course of studies;
- A recognised certificate of English Language Competency if English is not your first language .

Once you have submitted an online application you will be sent an acknowledgment email to the email address you provided when setting up your user account on the portal. The applicant portal will allow you to send and receive communications and track the progress of your application.



### Postgraduate Research Degrees Applicants

All students undertaking a research degree are assigned to a single principal supervisor. The supervisor's role is essentially that of an academic guide and mentor. If you are interested in applying for a degree by research, you are advised before submitting your application to contact the School with your research proposal and curriculum vitae and arrange a suitable supervisor. The Law School's website [www.tcd.ie/Law/research/](http://www.tcd.ie/Law/research/) and individual staff profile pages ([www.tcd.ie/Law/staff](http://www.tcd.ie/Law/staff)).

Research students are placed either directly on the Ph.D. register or on the Masters register. Research students on the Masters register may then transfer to the Ph.D. register if their progress has been satisfactory. Such transfers usually occur during the second year of full-time study.

The decision to accept or not to accept a student's application is exclusively with the discretion of the Law School.

### Closing Dates

No closing dates apply for applications to the M.Litt and Ph.D. Register but there are only two registration periods (September and March). Applicants are advised to apply as early as possible prior to their chosen registration period as supervisory capacity may be limited.

The closing date for the LL.M. courses are generally 31st May of the year you wish to commence study. Applicants are encouraged to apply as early as possible and can do so from November onwards.

### EU and Non-EU Applicants

Applicants apply either as an EU or a Non-EU Applicant

To be eligible to apply as an EU applicant (and qualify for EU fees), applicants must fulfill one or more of the following criteria:

<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>are ordinarily resident in the EU and who have received full-time further or higher education in the EU for three of the five years immediately preceding admission; or</li></ul>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>are ordinarily resident in the EU and have worked full-time in the EU for three of the five years immediately preceding admission; or</li></ul>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>hold a passport from an EU state and have received full-time further or higher education in the EU for three of the five years immediately preceding admission; or</li></ul>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Applicants are children of*: EU Government officials living abroad, semi-state officials who are on assignment in countries outside the EU, volunteer development workers, and certain EU officials as approved by the Department of Foreign Affairs.</li></ul>
<b>All other applications are considered to be "non-EU" or "international" applications.</b>

### Non-EU Applications:

#### English Language Requirements

All applicants whose first language is not English and who have not been educated through the medium of English must present **one** of the following qualifications in the English language:

- IELTS: Grade 6.5
- TOEFL: 88 - iBT, 230 - Computer based, 570 - paper based
- Cambridge Certificate of Advanced English: Grade C
- Cambridge Certificate of Proficiency in English: Grade C
- Pearson Test of English (Academic) - PTE Academic: a minimum score of 63 (with no section score below 59)

Please note that test scores are only valid for 2 years.

### Visa Requirements

Students who need visas are strongly advised to apply for a visa as soon as they have been offered, and have accepted, a place on a Trinity College Dublin academic programme. Applicants should note that visa applications can take time to be processed and that this time period can vary from a few weeks to, in some cases, six months. Only students who intend to enrol on full-time academic programmes can apply for a student visa. Student visas are not approved for part-time academic programmes.

#### Please Note:

- A student's registered status (EU/non-EU) cannot be changed during a programme for which s/he has registered.
- Full-time education in the EU does not by itself constitute ordinary residence.

## AWARDS AND SCHOLARSHIPS: RESEARCH DEGREE PROGRAMMES

### *College Awards*

#### **1. Postgraduate Ussher Fellowships**

These fellowships are only applicable to new entrants on the Research Register. The Fellowship fully covers EU and non-EU fees and provides an annual maintenance of 16,000 euro for three years. The annual maintenance is payable monthly via the College payroll.

#### ***What are the requirements for this Award?***

The Fellowships aim to support and develop gifted research students. They are awarded competitively on academic merit.

#### ***Will I have any teaching obligations?***

The fellowship is unrelated to teaching.

#### **2. Postgraduate Research Studentships**

These studentships are applicable to new entrants as well as continuing students on the Ph.D. Register. The studentship fully covers EU or non-EU fee and an annual maintenance of 8,000 euro for three years.

#### ***What are the requirements for this Award?***

The Studentships aim to support and develop gifted research students. They are awarded competitively on academic merit.

#### ***Will I have any teaching obligations?***

The holder of a studentship is required to engage in teaching-related activities, as advised by the appropriate Director of Teaching and Learning (Postgraduate) or his/her nominee, to a maximum of 6 hours per week in teaching term.

#### ***How do I apply for an Ussher Fellowship or Postgraduate Research Studentship?***

New entrants to the Research Register should apply for the Ussher Award by completing the relevant sections of the online application form. Continuing students who wish to apply for this Award should contact their School directly. Nominations are considered at various times of the year depending on the School. New applicants are advised to submit their application as early as possible.

### *School Specific Awards*

#### **1. John A. Boland Memorial Scholarship (Law):**

The John Boland memorial prize was founded in 2007 by subscription in memory of John Boland (LL.B., M.A., Barrister-at-Law, 1954), former U.K. Public Trustee, who founded the U.K. Trust for TCD (then called 'The London Trust for TCD'), and who was a very loyal graduate serving Trinity in many capacities. The Prize is awarded annually by the U.K. Trust for Trinity College Dublin for a new incoming research postgraduate student in Law. Award to be decided on the basis of merit in application. Value: Sterling £1,000 pa.

#### **2. France E. Moran Research Studentship:**

This studentship is offered by the Trinity Trust for research in any area of Irish law. The grant will normally be of one year's duration. The successful candidate will be required to register for the degree of M.Litt. The successful candidate may be required to assist with tutorial work in the Law School for four hours per week. Award to be decided on the basis of merit in application. Value, M.Litt. fees for the year will be paid, together with a tax-free stipend of 1,841-2,222 euro.

## SOCIAL ACTIVITIES AND THE LAW SCHOOL

In addition to supporting the activities of the College's many societies and student activities, the Law School regularly arranges social events in which staff and students participate. An annual staff-student walk around the scenic Hill of Howth takes place each Michaelmas Term. Special receptions for students are regularly held. Staff and students hold an annual cabaret (where talent is welcome but not compulsory!).



## THE STUDENT EXPERIENCE

### LAW STUDENT COLLOQUIUM

The Colloquium is a prestigious student conference at which law students of all levels present their work to their peers. It is held annually at Trinity College and organised by a committee of undergraduate and postgraduate students from the Law School. It has become usual for over 100 delegates to attend the conference, at which dozens of student speakers from Ireland and abroad contribute on all aspects of legal scholarship.

In previous years the Colloquium has been addressed by Mr Justice Ronan Keane, Mrs Justice Catherine McGuinness and Mr Justice Gerard Hogan. The encouragement of undergraduate speakers is a core mission of the organising committee and prizes are awarded to the best undergraduate participants. Successive committees have worked hard to ensure that no attendance fee is charged. To this end sponsorship has been secured from law firms and the Friends of the Colloquium, barristers who support the event. Involvement in the colloquium enables students to gain valuable skills in organisation, communication and legal research.







Trinity College Dublin has over 100 societies catering for all interests. Three societies cater specifically for law students, the Law Society, the European Law Students' Association and the College Branch of the Free Legal Advice Centre Ltd. The University is also home to several undergraduate publications, including the Trinity College Law Review.

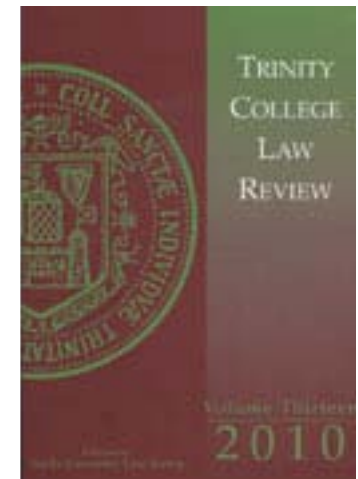
## TRINITY COLLEGE LAW REVIEW (TCLR)

### *International Students' Society*

## IRELAND AND DUBLIN CITY

Ireland, an island of approximately 70,000 square kilometers located on the western edge of Europe, has a population of just over 4 million. It is one of the least densely populated countries in the European Union and enjoys both the calm of countryside and coastal life and the bustle of a number of cities. With a strong infrastructure, it is easy to travel the length and breadth of the country and further afield, with air links to all major cities worldwide.

Dublin – Baile Atha Cliath in Irish – arose originally from a Viking settlement on the right bank of the River Liffey. The principal city of Ireland for most of its thousand-year history, it experienced a period of rapid expansion in the 18th Century, when it attained the status of one of Europe’s great cities, with magnificent squares and stately public buildings. Much of the elegance of that period is conserved in and around Trinity College.

Though small by present-day international standards and easily navigated, Dublin has nevertheless the resources of a capital city with a full and varied historical, cultural and intellectual life. The National Museum displays unique Celtic Bronze Age and early Christian material which reflects both the country’s wealth in gold at this period and the artistic sophistication of the early Irish craftsmen. The National Gallery of Ireland is considered one of the best small galleries in Europe. Both museums and gallery, flanking the seat of the Irish Parliament, are within a few hundred yards of Trinity College. The Irish Museum of Modern Art is just one of many other institutions in Dublin showcasing modern and contemporary art.



In the work of its writers, playwrights, actors and musicians, Dublin stands up well to comparison in quality and variety with any capital city in Europe. It is renowned particularly for its theatrical life, whether in established theatres such as the Abbey and the Gate, or in small experimental theatres, including Trinity’s own ‘Players’. In the literary field, the contribution of native sons of Dublin has been outstanding, with Jonathan Swift, Oliver Goldsmith, Oscar Wilde, Bernard Shaw, WB Yeats, James Joyce and Samuel Beckett as the most prominent names. A particular feature of Dublin life is the tradition of live music in every conceivable venue, from street busking, live music bars and clubs, to the National Concert Hall – not forgetting the ‘singing pubs’, located most notably in Dublin’s Bohemian centre, the Temple Bar.

A hub for sporting activities, Dublin hosts sporting events in all major sports and caters for those with more obscure sporting interests.

A variety of industries thrive in Dublin and students can benefit from studying at the centre of Irish political, administrative and commercial life. With many Irish and EU headquarters located in Dublin, students have access to many avenues upon completion of their studies at Trinity College.

Dublin in the 21st Century is an exciting and progressive capital city with much for people to do and see. With one of the youngest populations in Europe, it is home to many Irish and global eateries, boutiques, shops and markets to suit every budget and taste and provides students with a pleasant environment to carry out their studies at Trinity College.
